

Our house was full of books, and we remember many winter evenings listening to Mom read aloud.

Her eleven grandchildren were very precious to her. She spent hours shopping for the perfect birthday and Christmas gifts for each one. Tea parties, story time, and the playhouse in the big red barn were expressions of her love for them.
