Fern Louise (Denker) O'Connor was born to John and Ida (Spitzenberger) Denker in Haydraw, SD on October 25, 1930. She was going to be the first of her siblings to be born in a hospital, but after spending a week in Rapid City waiting, her mom decided she could be born at home like the other seven children were. Though she couldn't remember the exact details surrounding her birth, she was told two midwives were consulted regarding her entrance into the world. She also thinks the weather was fairly mild that day when horseback was the mode of travel to get the assistance needed. One of her favorite things to do when growing up was helping her dad and listening to his stories, which is something she learned from him--the gift of storytelling. She said he would have made a great history teacher, while her mom was the manager who got things done on the homestead. She said her mom was excited when she finally found pants for women on a trip, because much of the time she wore her husband's overalls to work. Family was important to Fern, and as the youngest of her family, she learned to be strong, opinionated, and straightforward as she grew up discussing many topics with her older brothers and sisters, and these traits have continued in the family line.

Fern graduated from Sturgis High School in 1948 and got a teaching certificate from Black Hills State, and enjoyed teaching country schools the most. She finished her teaching career in town after earning her BS degree in Education in 1980 from BHSC, graduating with her daughter. One of her greatest adventures in teaching was teaching during the 1949 blizzard, where she stayed with her two families of first-cousin students at Myron and Sophie Harwood's for the majority of 3 months. She was 19 years old at the time and her room served as classroom during the day and sleeping quarters at night. Her nephew, Richard Harwood, introduced her to her husband, Wayne O'Connor, when he came out to the country to do some hunting. They were married December 22, 1951 in Sturgis and shared almost 50 years together prior to his death in 2000. Fern and Wayne had 3 children, Mike, Jerry, and Peggy. As a couple, they had ups and downs, were active in AA/Al-Anon, and had many travel adventures together. She especially enjoyed the trips they had with her brother, George, and his wife. Trips continued after George and Wayne's death, when she would travel with George's widow, Vera, and niece, Beverly Fowble, to the Oregon coast. Besides being a teacher and traveler, she was a member of the United Methodist Church and Republican Women.


