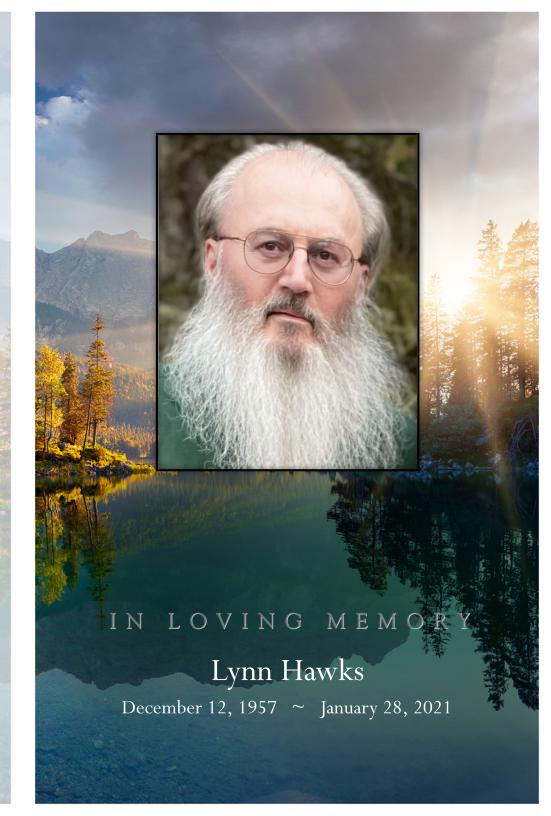

After he retired in 2000, he moved his family to the Black Hills, where they raised their girls, who were the highlight of his life. In the most recent years, he had tiptoed into the twenty-first century with his iPod touch, filters on Snapchat, connecting through Facebook with old friends, and one new best friend, Alexa. She was always ready to blare some classic rock tunes, answer questions about old movies, and get him to his appointments on time. Uncle Onion looked forward to outings at Janelle's folks, where they had delicious meals, laughter, and times of hunting and fishing. He was a man of few words but could fill the room with laughter with his one-liners. His brutally honest personality was met with a glance of shock or a burst of laughter. Joan tried her best to fill his endless sweet tooth with her homemade goodies. Tug would crank a creamy batch of banana nut ice cream and ask for the big guy's approval. Lynn will be forever in our hearts.
