Ralph David Keffeler was born in Sturgis, SD, on January 22, 1937, to John and Mary (Grubl) Keffeler. He attended school through the 8th grade at the Lower Alkali School. Later, he worked hard, studying on the floor with the kids to obtain his GED.

Ralph married Betty Ann Harwood on June 10, 1957, at the St. Francis of Assisi Church in Sturgis. The first year and a half that they were married, he worked at the Homestake Mine in Lead, SD. Eventually, they moved out to the John D. Keffeler ranch to carry on the heritage and the tradition of being a farmer and a rancher.

Ralph was a great farmer and took extreme pride in his crops. Like all farmers, he didn't think he had enough horse power to pull the bigger equipment. He hooked 2 M's together to pull the 24 ft "one-ways" while sitting on and driving the back M. He later regretted not patenting the idea.

Ralph loved to see how tall his sorghum could grow. One year it grew so tall, when Doug and John went to start cutting the sorghum in Ralph's John Deere, the 4010 completely disappeared except for the exhaust pipe on top. Ralph was a farmer through and through just like his dad taught him. His only stipulation was; "If it wasn't "Green" it wasn't worth bringing home." Including, Betty's garden tractor. (She did come home with a red one.)

As a rancher, Ralph began his first cattle herd with the traditional Herefords with heifers from his dad's herd. Later in years, Ralph fell in love with the Charolais breed. He was often heard to say, "You never lose a Charolais calf, because you had to be with the mother cows all the time during calving season." When the market switched to Angus, Ralph did not give up on his Charolais cows, but did concede to Angus bulls.

Ralph took a lot of pride in his brand and the quality of his herd. Branding at the Keffeler ranch was always a fun day full of family and friends working together. He enjoyed the story telling and seeing his brand on his calves. In the fall when the calves went to the sale barn, Ralph had a good reputation with the cattle buyers of having uniformed and quality calves.

Ralph took flying lessons where he eventually soloed. Unfortunately, he scared himself and quit flying as a pilot. One of his greatest joys was riding as a gunner for Dewey Rathke and Roger Hlavka hunting for coyotes or whatever else they could scare up. Ralph could never understand why Betty was so worried every time he went flying.

What Ralph cherished most in life was family and doing things together as a family. Whether it was a drive through Spearfish Canyon, or pulling the kids out of school to go snowmobiling in the hills as long as it was family time together. Whenever there was a country dance out to Union Center or Opal, they all loaded up in the car and away they went. He loved going to the dances, but didn't necessarily like to dance until after a drink or two.

In his younger years, he was quite the prankster, especially with the kids and grandkids. The kids learned, who sat next to him, to be aware of the gravy being served up the arm versus on the potatoes. Scaring the grandkids that Bear Butte was a volcano and could erupt anytime was another one of his many pranks.

Everyone who knew Ralph knows how much he loved to visit and tell stories. He never met a person he didn't like or visit with. The boyfriends the girls brought home to meet the parents were warned that they will be sitting at the kitchen table for hours listening to Ralph's stories. Stories now, the family will forever treasure.


