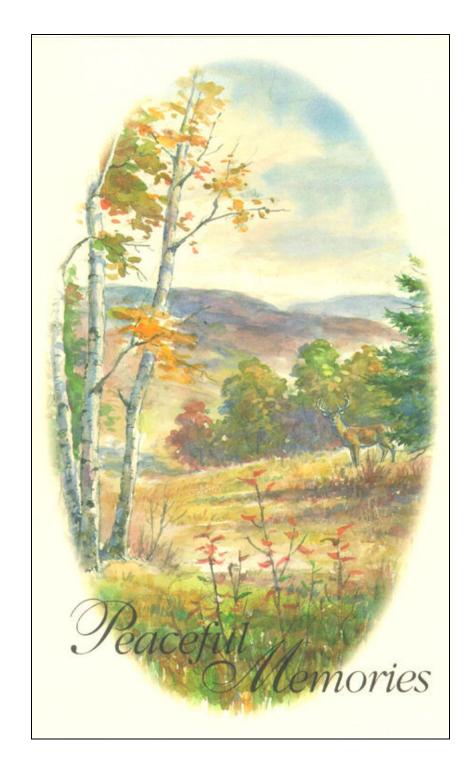
George loved to write poems. He also enjoyed playing sports, especially fast pitch softball.
