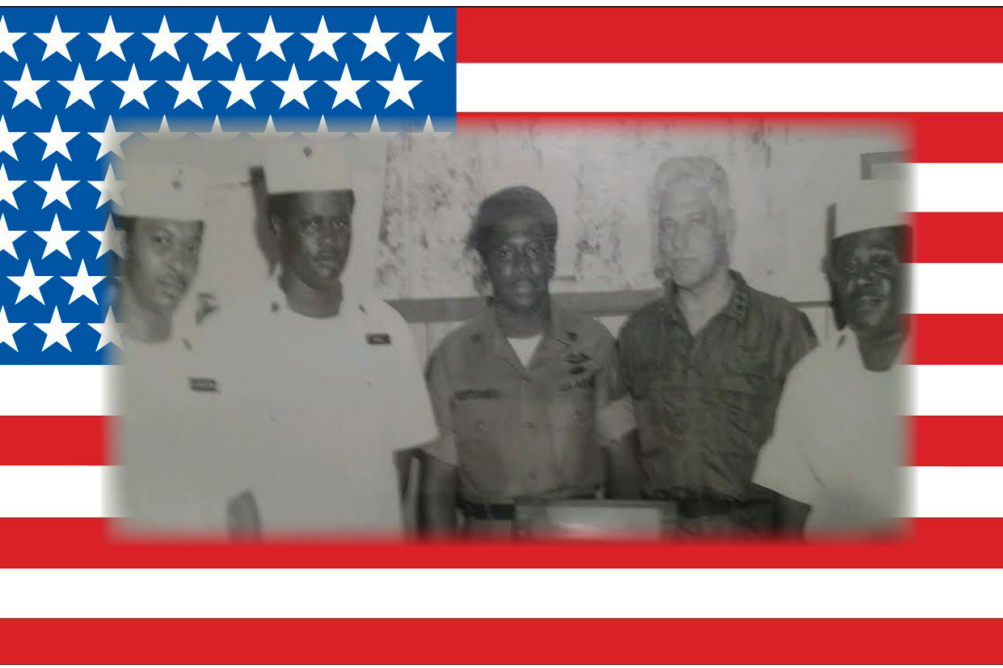

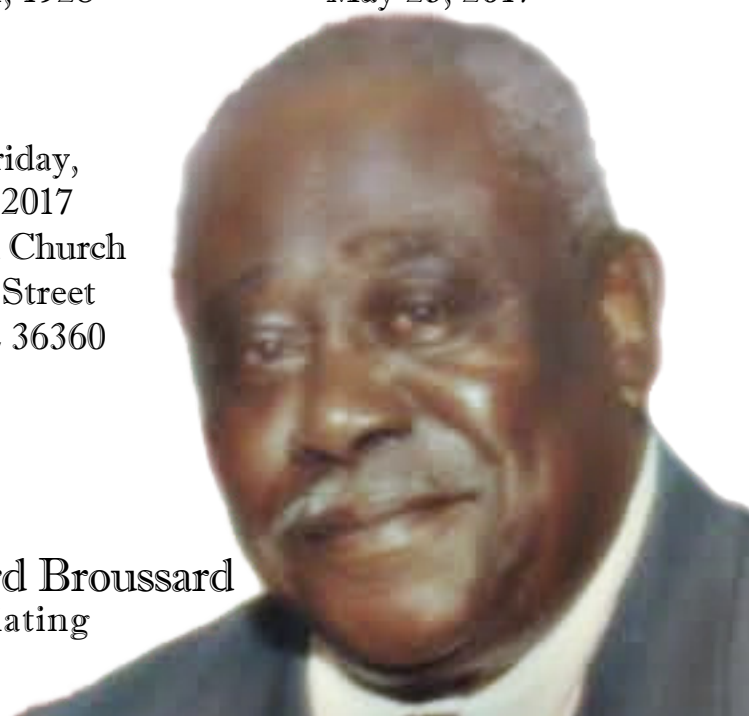

Retired U.S. Army SSG Jimmie Lee Horton went home to his Savior, Jesus Christ, at 6:28 a.m. Tuesday, May 23, 2017. He was 89.

Mr. Horton was born to the late Corine Morgan and Lawrence Horton on Monday, May 21, 1928. Mr. Horton spent his childhood in Atlanta, Georgia. He was a Korean War veteran who was drafted into the U.S. Army at the age of 24 and served his country faithfully for 22 years. He also retired from civil service. During his years of service he was awarded several awards, including the United Nations Service Medal; Korean Service Medal; Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal; Good Conduct Medal; and Army Commendation Medal. He spent much of his military service as a food service specialist. This was an opportunity for him to cultivate his love for cooking. Aside from his military service, Mr. Horton attended Wallace College for certifications in carpentry and brick masonry. He constructed a significant portion of the home in which his wife, the former Josephine Floyd, still resides. Mr. Horton also built many other things. He operated a dance hall, owned a café, and had several other business ventures.

Mr. Horton accepted Jesus Christ as his Lord and Savior later in life. He was a faithful member of Shiloh Seventh-day Adventist Church, where he served as a deacon.

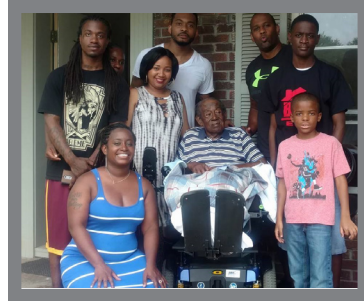
I'm Free
