Edna Marie Erickson was born November 30, 1926, to Elmer H. and Bessie Mae (Smith) Erickson at the family homestead on Middle Alkali, twenty miles east of Sturgis, SD. Since no doctors were available, Elmer delivered his first daughter!

Edna was the sixth child born to this family. She followed five brothers, Richard Harold, Carroll Dwight, Lloyd Elmer, and twins Wayne E. and Wilber E. Following Edna's birth, the family increased by 3 more with the birth of Raymond LeRoy, Melvin Loren, and Mary Lou Emma.

Edna received her education from 1<sup>st</sup> grade through 8<sup>th</sup> grade in a one-room school house (Hall School) District #56 located east of the family home. After graduating from the 8<sup>th</sup> grade, Edna missed school for a year as she worked on neighbors' dairies in order to help out with the family finances. While Edna was in high school, she worked for room and board for an army major's family at Ft. Meade. In January 1945, Edna moved to Washington State and found employment at Madigan General Hospital at Ft. Lewis as a patient dining room aide.

While living in Washington, Edna met and fell in love with Corporal Robert Andrew Culbertson. They were married on Sept. 8, 1945, in Tacoma, WA. The family grew with the birth of 3 daughters, Janis Marie, Sherrill Mae, and Karlene Mary and 2 sons, John Douglas and Robert Andrew, Jr. The marriage ended in divorce in 1958 and Edna became the sole support for the family.

Through Edna's hard work and love, their family life stabilized. Her children all attended school in Sturgis and were baptized in the Methodist Church. The following years were a time spent maintaining a bond with her children and grandchildren that she referred to as her "blessings".

On Oct. 4, 1971, Edna found love again and was married to Earl Thomas Matz in Las Vegas, Nevada. They made their home together in Sturgis until Earl Passed away on Oct. 20, 2006.
