An outdoorsman: he enjoyed hunting and fishing with his sons and grandsons from time to time. He enjoyed gardening. He had a love for horses and farm life.



I'm in the shelter of His hands.


Here there is no sadness, no sorrow, and no pain. Here there is no crying and I'll never hurt again.
